


Figure 4.1. Short-term effectiveness by covert tactic.





Figure 4.5. US-backed covert regime change and civil war: bivariate correlations. Significance level: *-10%, **-5%, ***-1%.




Figure 4.6. US-backed covert regime change and mass killings: bivariate correlations. Significance level: *-10%, **-5%, ***-1%.




Figure 5.1. US-backed regime change attempts by administration, 1947–1989.
